

### Vision

The Children, Youth and Families Department partners with communities to strengthen families in New Mexico to be productive and selfsufficient.

### **Mission**

CYFD believes in the strengths and resiliency of families who are our partners and for whom we advocate to enhance their safety and wellbeing. We respectfully serve and support children and families and supervise youth in responsive, community-based system of care that is client-centered, family-focused and culturally competent.



### **Protective Services Initiatives**

- To continue efforts ensuring timely response to reports of maltreatment, enhancing voluntary services to at risk families, providing safe homes for children in outof-home care, and working with families to address the risk issues that contribute to child maltreatment
- To improve outcomes addressing the unique need of older youth in faster care in the areas of education, financial assistance and housing
- To enhance visitation with children in foster care through staff training, tracking mechanisms and quality assurance reviews
- To expand foster and adoptive family recruitment efforts to increasing the number of placement resources available for children needing homes
- To partner with the New Mexico Court Improvement Project and the courts to expedite permanency for children by reducing delays, minimizing the need for continuances, expediting appeals and enhancing the quality of representation
- To facilitate the active engagement of parents, foster parents and youth in case planning through Team Decision Making, adoption mediation, video conference and increasing the participation of incarcerated parents

# Did You Know???

Background on the CFSR :	The Child and Family Services Review (CFSR) is the Federal government's process for evaluating the performance of State child welfare agencies with regard to achiev ing positive outcomes for children and families. The CFSR determines the State's conformity across seven outcomes and seven systemic factors. It is authorized by the Social Security Amendments of 1994 requiring the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to review child and family services programs funded under titles IV- B and IV-E. The Administration for Children and Families (ACF) coordinates the activities of the CFSR. All 50 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico completed their first round of reviews by 2004. No state or territory achieved substantial conformity. For Round II, ACF has made the standards more stringent, requiring a higher level of performance by the states. New Mexico is currently in Round II of the federal CRSR.
The CFSR & PIP Process :	The CFSR has two phases: 1) a statewide assessment and 2) an onsite review of outcomes and program systems. The statewide assessment allows the State to compare its performance on certain safety and permanency data indicators with national standards determined by the ACF. The onsite portion of the review includes: (1) case record reviews; (2) interviews with children and families engaged in services; and (3) interviews with community stakeholders, such as the courts and community agencies, foster families, and caseworkers and service providers. The information from these two phases is used to determine whether or not the State is operating in substantial conformity. If a state is not in substantial conformity with an outcome, the state must develop and implement a Program Improvement Plan (PIP). States that do not achieve the improvements will be penalized. NM completed the statewide assessment and onsite review in 2007. Over 100 individuals representing the judicial community, foster parents, community service providers, caseworkers, child and family advocates and youth in foster care participated in these efforts. In August of 2007, New Mexico received a courtesy copy of the final report. That report identified the areas where the state was not operating in substantial conformity and where program improvement efforts were needed. CYFD and the ACF have worked together for 10 months to develop an approved PIP. New Mexico has 2 years in which to deploy the PIP activities and an overlapping third year to bring about substantial conformity with all the federal PIP requirements. New Mexico's PIP process, including the overlapping year, ends March 31, 2011.
Nhat's Being Measured? :	The CFSR assesses State performance on 23 items relevant to 7 outcomes and 22 items pertaining to 7 systemic factors. In the Outcomes Section of the report, an overall rating of Strength or Area Needing Improvement is assigned to each of the 23 items. State performance on the seven outcomes is evaluated as Substantially Achieved, Partially Achieved, and Not Achieved.
Results For New Mexíco :	The 2007 CFSR identified several areas of high performance in New Mexico with regard to achieving many outcomes for children. New Mexico meets the national stan- dards for two of the national data indicators—Permanency Composite 2: Timeliness of adoptions, and Permanency Composite 3: Achieving permanency for children in foster care for extended time periods. The State did not meet the national standards for national data indicators pertaining to the absence of recurrence of maltreatment, the absence of maltreatment in foster care, the timeliness and permanency of reunification, and placement stability. With regard to systemic factors, New Mexico was found to be in substantial conformity with the factors of Statewide Information System and Quality Assurance System. New Mexico was not in substantial conformity with four of the seven systemic factors—Case Review System, Training, Service Array, and Foster and Adoptive Parent Licensing, Recruitment, and Retention.
CFSR and PIP:	The overall goal behind the CFSR and PIP implementation is to improve safety, permanency, and well being of children across the nation. For New Mexico, reporting data related to PIP measures on a state and county level will help to improve the outcomes in which PIP conformity has not been met. To meet this end, it is beneficial to share how New Mexico is performing at the county level in order to find and address specific areas that need improvement. The <i>360 Degrees County Profiles</i> tie into achievement of the PIP by providing publicly available state and county level data every quarter, so that stakeholders in the PIP process can have an accurate and up-to date picture of New Mexico's performance. A portion of the data included in the <i>360 Degrees County Profiles</i> looks at the same measures and sub-measures used for New Mexico in the PIP, but drills down to the county level. Policy makers, managers, field workers, and other agents of change can all use these data as touchstones with the common goal of improving safety, permanency, and well being for children, youth, and families in New Mexico.

According to the US Census in 2005, Cibola County attained an overall population of 25,595 or 1.43% of the state's total population. There were 7,845 children in the county in 2005; this represents 1.5% of the state's total children under 18. While the whole county accounts for **1.5%** of the state's total children under 18, Cibola County had **2.98%** of the state's total children in care as of March 31, 2008.




### **CHILDREN WITH A FINALIZED ADOPTION** WITHIN 24 MONTHS OF ENTRY INTO CARE














Trends of Children With a Finalized Adoption Within 24 Months of Entry Into Care ACF National Standard = 32.0%








### VALENCIA COUNTY (REGION 1/VALREE LOPEZ COUNTY MANGER)
