




- To continue efforts ensuring timely response to reports of maltreatment, enhancing voluntary services to at risk families, providing safe homes for children in outof-home care, and working with families to address the risk issues that contribute to child maltreatment
- To improve outcomes addressing the unique need of older youth in faster care in the areas of education, financial assistance and housing
- To enhance visitation with children in foster care through staff training, tracking mechanisms and quality assurance reviews
- To expand foster and adoptive family recruitment efforts to increasing the number of placement resources available for children needing homes
- To partner with the New Mexico Court Improvement Project and the courts to expedite permanency for children by reducing delays, minimizing the need for continuances, expediting appeals and enhancing the quality of representation
- To facilitate the active engagement of parents, foster parents and youth in case planning through Team Decision Making, adoption mediation, video conference and increasing the participation of incarcerated parents




Recurrence of Substaniated Maltreatment Within 6 Months of a previously substantiated report of Maltreatment

Did You Know???

- Over the past several years New Mexico has consistently reunified children with their families, with the ratio of those reunified typically exceeding the national standard by around 10 percent. Some of this performance is directly attributed to the mechanism by which a large majority of children in New Mexico enter foster care - emergency custody, often referred to as a "48 hour hold".
- Reunification is a complex issue, involving not only determining when a child can return home, but also considering which children should come into care. It is important to realize that there may be a link between the measure for children reunified and the measures for: 1) recurrence of maltreatment within 6 months; and 2) children reentering care within 12 months.
- Because of increasingly complex health, behavioral, and economic needs, more children and families in the New Mexico child welfare system may require sustained interventions that extend beyond the 12 month timeframe of the reunification measure. This requires careful monitoring and balancing of cases to assure positive outcomes for children and families.

Children Reentering Care Within Twelve Months of a Prior Episode

According to the US Census in 2005, Cibola County attained an overall population of 25,595 or 1.43% of the state's total population. There were 7,845 children in the county in 2005; this represents 1.5% of the state's total children under 18. While accounting for **1.5%** of the state's total children under 18, Cibola County had **2.3%** of the state's total children in care as of June 30, 2007.




CPS ALLEGATION TYPES OF CHILD MALTREATMENT - QUARTER 4 SFY 07: APRIL - JUNE 2007









PERMANENCY PLAN GOALS OF CHILDREN IN CUSTODY New Mexico



Current Placement of Children being Served by Protective Services as of June 30, 2007

Pre-Adoption:

Children who are in an Adoptive family home and have an adoptive agreement signed and in effect.

Foster Care:

Children who are in the custody of the State and reside in an out-of-home setting. Foster Care may include Family Foster Care, Specialized Foster Care, Emergency Foster Care and Relative Home placements.

Independent Living:

Youth living independently and not residing in a traditional Foster Care placement. These children have a service type of maintenance, and can range from ages 16-21.

- Post Decree Children whose families have met all requirements for adoption, including the final adoptive decree issued by the court.
- Institutional Care

Institutional Care may include Crisis Shelter, Emergency Shelter and Group Home placements.

Title IV-E Guardianships:

These children were part of the federally sponsored IV-E Waiver demonstration project. On-going Support provided by State General Fund resources.

Title IV-E Tribal:

For Native American children being served by their tribes. The tribes have joint power of agreements with the State. They receive foster care payment.

- Residential Treatment Care

Residential Treatment Care may include RTC JHACO Accredited and Non-Accredited placements.

Treatment Foster Care

Treatment Foster Care serves those children in need of a high level of care to address behavioral health needs.




PENDING INVESTIGATIONS: JUNE 2007






CPS ALLEGATION TYPES OF CHILD MALTREATMENT - QUARTER 4 SFY 07: APRIL - JUNE 2007




CPS ALLEGATION TYPES OF CHILD MALTREATMENT - QUARTER 4 SFY 07: APRIL - JUNE 2007


CPS ALLEGATION TYPES OF CHILD MALTREATMENT - QUARTER 4 SFY 07: APRIL - JUNE 2007



Pre-Adoption:

Children who are in an Adoptive family home and have an adoptive agreement signed and in effect.

Foster Care:

Children who are in the custody of the State and reside in an out-of-home setting. Foster Care may include Family Foster Care, Specialized Foster Care, Emergency Foster Care and Relative Home placements.

Independent Living:

Youth living independently and not residing in a traditional Foster Care placement. These children have a service type of maintenance, and can range from ages 16-21.

- Post Decree Children whose families have met all requirements for adoption, including the final adoptive decree issued by the court.
- Institutional Care

Institutional Care may include Crisis Shelter, Emergency Shelter and Group Home placements.

Title IV-E Guardianships:

These children were part of the federally sponsored IV-E Waiver demonstration project. On-going Support provided by State General Fund resources.

Title IV-E Tribal:

For Native American children being served by their tribes. The tribes have joint power of agreements with the State. They receive foster care payment.

- Residential Treatment Care

Residential Treatment Care may include RTC JHACO Accredited and Non-Accredited placements.

Treatment Foster Care

Treatment Foster Care serves those children in need of a high level of care to address behavioral health needs.
